



You may ask your papa to hire people to catch Santa Claus. But even if they did not see Santa coming down the chimney, what would that prove?



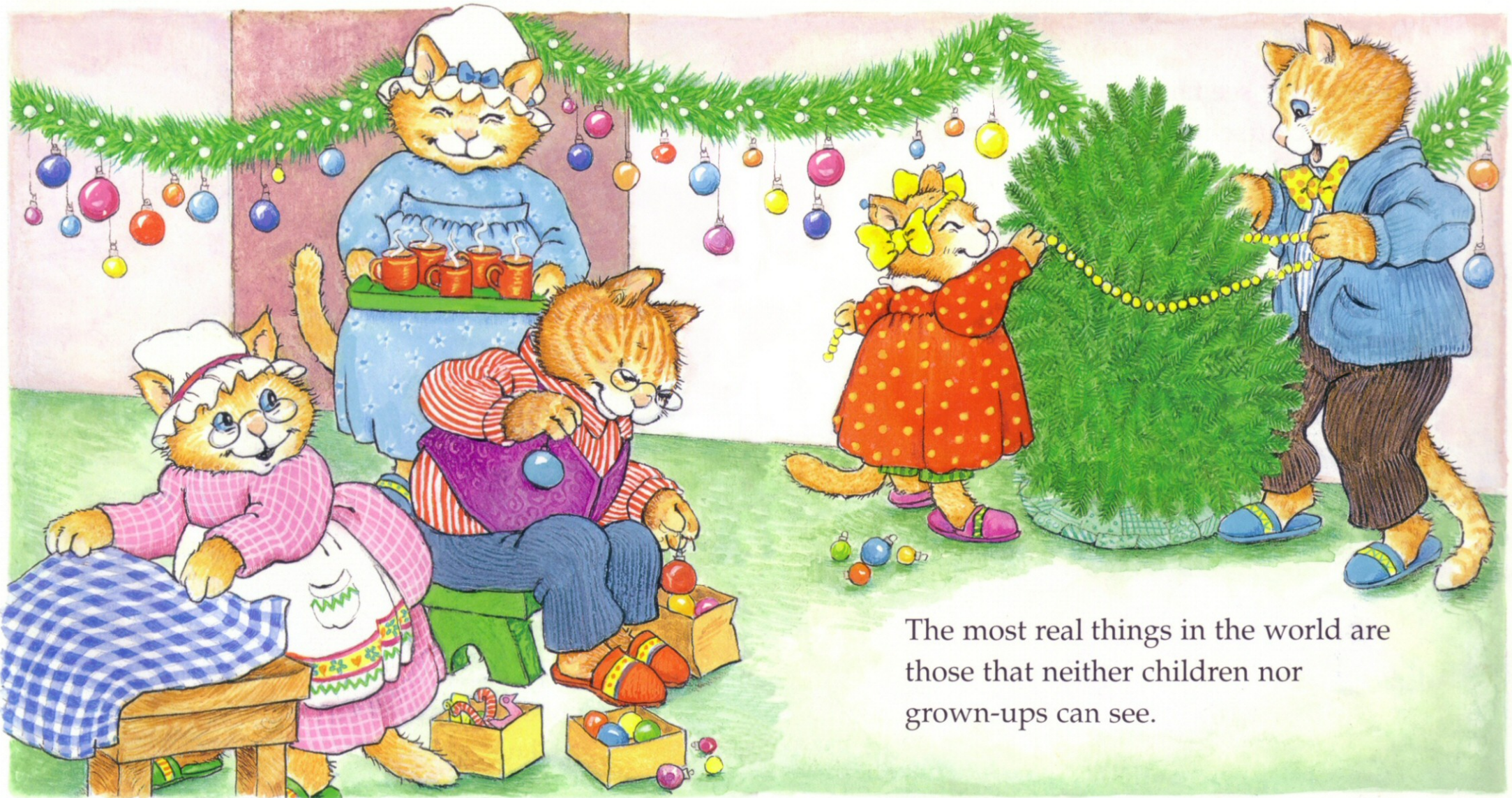


Nobody sees Santa Claus.
